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A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

A theme of my presidency has been development of SASS's financial strength. This topic is important because SASS faces many challenges that other learned societies face – canceled conferences, inflation, pandemic, and effects on membership. But we are small and have fewer resources. What can we do?

One of the ways that our peer societies are responding to these challenges is by enhancing their revenue streams. They are also putting on exciting conferences. Many have revised membership cost structures. They are working to bring experienced and new to their annual conferences. And they are asking their members to give more to their societies. SASS needs to adopt similar changes.

Lynn Wilkinson and UT-Austin are putting together a terrific conference in one of the US's most exciting cities, the home of SXSW! Propose a stream or a paper and join us for what will be an awesome conference! Don't miss out! (I already bought my plane tickets.)

Our membership costs and their structure badly need updating. Many societies pro-rate membership costs by members' income level. Such progressive cost sharing is equitable. SASS's membership cost structure can be more equitable, and generate more revenue.

Other societies also offer members the opportunity to make a sustaining member donation every year. I know I always give extra to the MLA or SCMS when they ask for a sustaining donation. Should we not make it possible for SASS members to make a sustaining donation? We haven't.

Finally, we need to improve our development. We have sought your trust with improved financial control, excellent conference organization, and clear, regular communication. We need members to continue to give, or to give for the first time. You can make SASS stronger by giving.

As a first step to such giving, we are launching a #100x\$100 campaign this year. Will 100 SASS members give \$100 in 2022? (Graduate students and others who wish may give to the campaign at the discount rate of \$25.) With the 100 x 100s campaign, a key goal is to get to 100% membership participation in SASS development. Let us join in solidarity and all build SASS for the future.

WHY AUSTIN?

t is no secret that the state of Texas has enacted some controversial and questionable laws recently. This fact has raised concerns among the SASS Executive Council and membership about travelling to the state or supporting the local economy with a conference. We know that some of you have reservations about our upcoming conference in Austin and I want to address these concerns head-on.

So, why is SASS proceeding with plans to hold a conference in Austin? The executive council and the officers have discussed the challenges associated with an Austin conference at length before we finalized plans for a meeting in the Texas capital. We had the same concerns you did but ultimately opted for a Texas meeting for a number of reasons.

> 1) The University of Texas at Austin is a fantastic university that does great, rigorous academic research. We have colleagues there with valuable insights into the field. We don't want to exclude them or their work based on the decisions of lawmakers. In fact, we want to encourage scholarly pursuits and academic inquiry that will continue to challenge ideas and opinions and to promote and nurture DEI work at the university and in the community.

> 2) The meeting will be held on the UT campus. We are confident that the university is doing everything within their power to ensure that visitors are safe and welcome. Additionally, Austin itself is known to be an open-minded and welcoming city. Even (or maybe especially...) Texans acknowledge Austin as a special place in the state. I have recently heard the word "oasis" thrown around...

3) We need to be challenged. As academics it is productive to step out of our comfort zones and address challenges directly. Texas will force us to do that, and we are up to the challenge. And it is not just a political and ideological challenge. We have never held a conference in Texas. We tend to think of very specific places in North America as having strong Nordic ties, but it is time to shake up those assumptions. Texas and Austin have more to offer Scandinavianists than we think.

4) Austin is a vibrant and exciting city. They don't call it the live music capital of the world for no reason! Austin – and particularly downtown Austin and the area near the university – is home to a wide array of music venues, interesting and innovative culinary experiences, international art and arts venues, and numerous festivals and events. Austin is definitely one of the US's most dynamic small cities – a place everyone should visit at least once. SASS is happy to help our members see a piece of the world they may not otherwise have an opportunity to visit.

Rest assured, we are working with the university and the local community to ensure that our members are safe, comfortable, and welcomed in Austin. As planning progresses, we will make information about the space, the university, and the community as easily accessible as possible. CALL FOR STREAMS

The theme of this SASS meeting is **everyday life**, in the sense that the French theorist Michel de Certeau used the term in his 1980 study, L'invention du quotidien/The Practice of Everyday Life. In this work, which grew out of research originally funded as a study of consumer behavior, de Certeau argues that consumers, as well as people in precapitalist cultures, have the potential to react creatively to commodities, religious doctrines, and other cultural systems. Like canny shoppers at the supermarket, people may strive to combine what's available to them to make the best possible meal. Colonized people sometimes appropriate aspects of the colonizers' culture that subvert its oppressive potential. Workers in unrewarding jobs may surf the internet while appearing to conform to bureaucratic routines.

What to make of de Certeau's emphasis on the positive role of creative bricolage or tinkering? What is its relationship to more explicit forms of resistance or more confrontational strategies to improve conditions for individuals or groups? Does de Certeau's work allow for more room to manouver than that of other theorists, such as Michel Foucault?

Michel de Certeau's work offers a useful framework for exploring the roles of everyday life in literature, culture, and film, but stream proposals and papers need not engage explicitly with it. Other approaches are welcome.

POLITICS OF POPULISM, NATIONALISM, AND IDENTITY (ASSISTANT PROFESSOR, TENURE TRACK) – UNIVERSITY OF TENNESSEE, POLITICAL SCIENCE

The Department of Political Science at the University of Tennessee invites applications for a tenure track, assistant professor position in the politics of populism, nationalism, and/or identity to begin Fall 2023. We are particularly interested in applicants who use rigorous and creative analytical approaches to address substantively important questions pertaining to these themes. Relevant research interests include (but are not limited to): nationalist, populist, or nativist parties or movements; conflicts, inequalities, or other relations between identity groups such as those based on ethnicity, race, religion, caste, social class, or national origin; politics of and policies pertaining to historically marginalized groups; xenophobia and discrimination toward migrants, refugees, or other marginalized individuals; etc.

The successful candidate must have strong research skills and a theoretically oriented research agenda that will lead to publication in peer-reviewed outlets (journals and/or books). The position is open with respect to method, subfield, and geographic region. Preference will be shown for applicants who have research and teaching interests that complement existing departmental interests and strengths (especially in the areas of global security and/or the politics of inequality), have a capacity for attracting extramural funding, demonstrate evidence of or potential for college/university teaching excellence, and exhibit a commitment to diversity and inclusion. The Knoxville campus of the University of Tennessee is seeking candidates who have the ability to contribute in meaningful ways to the diversity and intercultural goals of the University. The position is a 9-month, tenure-track appointment, and the salary is competitive and commensurate with qualifications and experience.
